Message from the Headteacher 5th July 2024

Dear Parents and Carers

Having promised I would report the results of our Mabel Prichard general election, we ended up with a very hung parliament, with the vote being shared across all parties. There are pictures later of each of the party stands where the students made excellent cases for why they shoud receive a vote. Unfortunately not all practice was in line with the electoral commission guidance, with LA Boronze offering biscuits to voters and Plaid Cymru promising free rice and chicken once a month. There were some excellent sensory experiences on offer with a the Scottish National Party running a 'search for Nessie' in jelly and the Green Party offering a range of plants and natural materials to represent their cause. Overall the students had an excellent interactice sensory election, raising their awareness of the major parties and exploring the concept of choice.

This means we have been recognised for our practice in building learners' essential skills for life. The silver award is given when a school community demosntrates a sound knowledge of these skills and teaches them through multiple areas of the school's practice, including in the classroom environment, celebrating student achievement and in through the curriculum.

Can I remind you again that we are experiencing very high levels of illness at the moment and if your son or daughter is unwell it is really important you do not send them into school as we are trying to control the spread of infection on both sites.

The learners have thoroughly enjoyed our practical maths sessions and this term's topic of capacity has been particularly popular. This has involved lots of measuring using water and other substances.


News from the Classrooms

- Progress they are making to improve the timeliness of education and health care (EHC) needs assessments.
